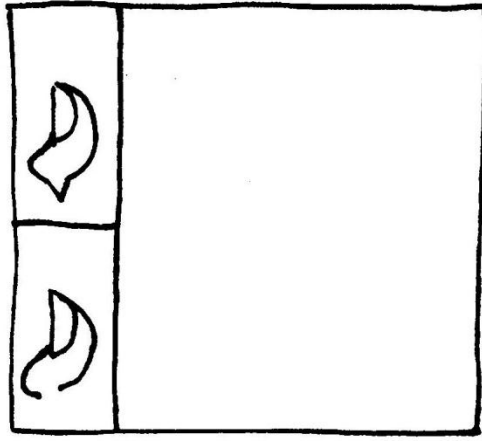
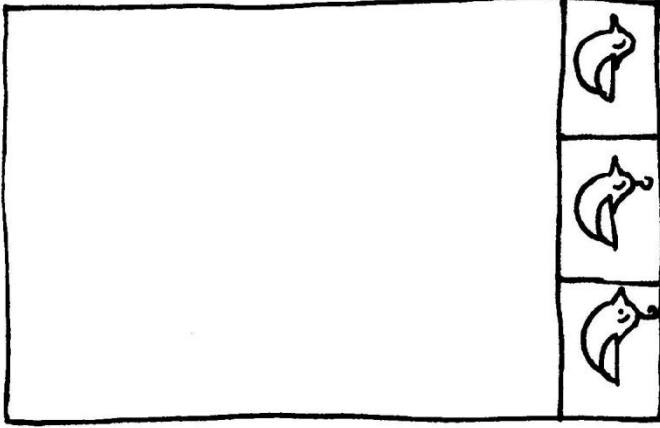


Can someone out there tell me why?
We'll use that dot to make an eye!

But if you think your bird's confused
a question mark can be used.
You draw it so it's in a spot
where you'll place the bottom dot
right above his "V" shaped beak,
just above his ear and cheek.

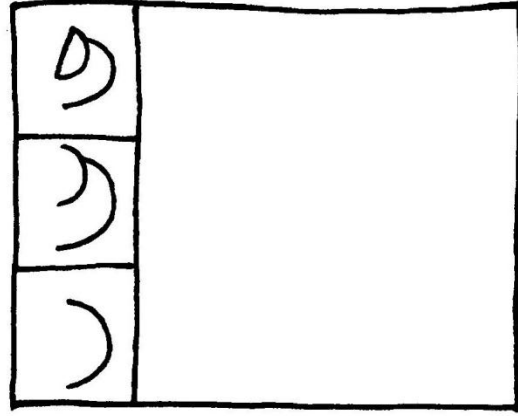
Then add a plume above his head
(as though he just got out of bed.)
What you draw is up to you...
I often draw a curly Q!

Now that you've drawn that backward letter
your bird's prepared to speak much better.
But if you want your bird to hear
draw a backward "C" right here.



Then draw a "U" turned upside down.
His head looks somewhat like a frown.

Now if you want your bird to speak
you'll have to give your bird a beak.
So draw a sideways "letter V."
That sure looks like a beak to me!

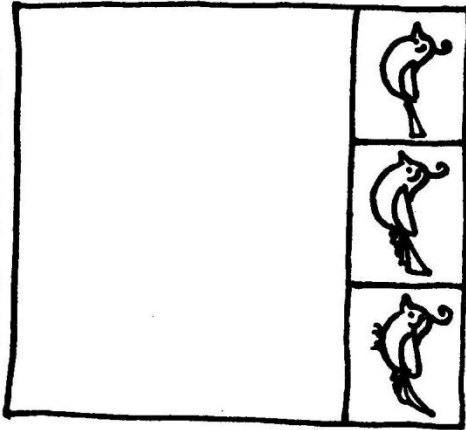



The first thing that you'll want to do
is draw a smile that's like a "U."

Now move onto the second thing,
a smile and line that make a wing.

Let's do the next step all together.
Let's give our bird a tail feather.
If that turned out, then draw some more.
I often draw in three or four!


Draw little lines to make bird feet...
... and now your bird's almost complete!

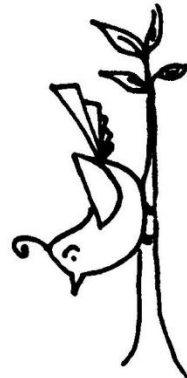
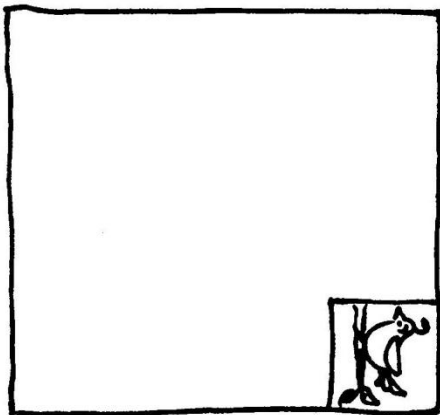
Bird Book
